MUNICIPAL ORDINANCE NO. 23 Series of 2019

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A CHILD WELFARE AND PROTECTION CODE OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF NUEVA ERA, ILOCOS NORTE.

WHEREAS, in its commitment to the Convention of the Rights of the Child, the Government of the Philippines adopted the Philippine National Strategic Framework for Plan Development for Children (2000-2025), or briefly called as "CHILD 21", which outlines the goals and strategies to realize the vision of the Filipino Child within the first quarter of the 21st Century;

WHEREAS, "Child 21" binds the national and local governments to synchronize development plans and operations with the child as the focal beneficiary, hence the need of mainstreaming the child rights in local development planning;

WHEREAS, "Child 21" further states the need to be sensitive to the needs of the child by building a Child-Friendly Society where children are nurtured and allowed to grow and develop in dignity, protected from threats to their well-being and free to express themselves and participate in their development;

WHEREAS, national laws, rules and regulations promulgated for the welfare and protection of children need to be strengthened at the local levels by also adopting supportive and enabling local rules, policies and approaches;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it enacted by the Sangguniang Bayan of Nueva Era, Ilocos Norte, that:

Article I TITLE AND POLICY

Section 1. <u>Title.</u> This Ordinance shall be known as the CHILD WELFARE AND PROTECTION CODE OF NUEVA ERA, ILOCOS NORTE, briefly referred to herein as the Code.

Section 2. Statement of Policy. Consistent with, and guided by, all existing national laws, policies, as well as conventions to which the Government is a party, regarding the development and protection of children, it is hereby declared to be the policy of the municipality to consider itself both as the agent and partner of the Government of the Philippines insofar as their implementation and in furtherance thereto.

It is the policy of the municipality to always regard children as its fragile, delicate human resources highly deserving utmost care. Towards this end, it shall always include in all phases of its local development plans, programs and investments for the welfare, benefits and protection in keeping faith with the generally –accepted notion that "the youth are the hope of the nation."

ARTICLE II

LOCAL COUNCIL FOR THE WELFARE AND PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

Section 3. Creation of a Council for the Welfare and Protection of Children. There is hereby created a Local Council for the Welfare and Protection of Children, referred to in this Code as the Council, which shall comprised of the following:

- 1. Chairperson : Municipal Mayor
- 2. Municipal Committee Chair on Women and Family
- 3. Municipal Planning and Development Coordinator
- 4. Municipal Social Welfare Officer
- 5. Municipal School Principal
- 6. Municipal Civil Registrar
- 7. Municipal Counsel
- 8. Municipal Federation of SK President
- 9. Municipal Health Officer
- 10.Municipal Agriculture Officer
- 11. ABC President
- 12. Municipal Treasurer
- 13. Municipal Nutrition Action Officer
- 14. Municipal President of Day Care Workers
- 15. Four Religious Sector Representatives
- 16.Chief of Police
- 17. Municipal Local Government Operations Officer

Section 3. <u>Powers and Functions of the Council.</u> The Council shall have the following as its powers and functions.

- 1) Formulate Annual Action Plan for Children and submit the same to the Municipal Development Council and, upon approval, shall cause for its implementation;
- Take cognizant of every issue, case or incident of child abuse of whatever form, reported to any office or agency within or outside the municipality, and deliberate as to appropriate action or assistance deem needed, or render recommendations thereto, or initiate action if needed and proper;
- 3) Monitor documents such issues, cases or incidents reported or referred to it, or acted upon, and render progress or statistical reports annually or as often as necessary or appropriate decided by the Council;
- 4) Initiate, conduct, sponsor or participate in child-related for a or related assembly, as well as attend similar events either local, national or international gatherings, and may conduct fund-raising drives or campaigns to finance such adopted projects and activities;
- 5) Coordinate with all other sectors, office or organization, including those offices represented in the Council, by consolidating all their child-related or children-oriented programs and activities to form part of the integrated local children-friend program;
- 6) Institutionalize child-related projects or activities prescribed in this Code, including those the Council may so adopt;

- 7) Serve as the lead advocacy group insofar as rights of a child, the issues and concerns towards the welfare and protection of children in the municipality;
- 8) Serve as the advisory body of all Sanggunian in so far as policies and measures related to child welfare and protection;
- Adopts and enforce its own internal rules of procedure governing its members, and such other standard operating mechanism or procedures, including provision for benefits of members;
- 10) Adopt a system of award or recognition to any person, office, organization or entity that has extended or performed outstanding support, or does initiatives for the welfare and protection of children.
- 11) Prepare contingency measures to protect children and their families from natural and man-made calamities.

Section 5. Meetings. The Council shall have a regular meeting of at least once every quarter, and may convene special meetings as often as may be called by the Chairman, or at the instance of at least three (3) members. Under no instance the Council shall meet outside the territorial jurisdiction of the municipality.

Section 6. <u>Executive Officer & Secretariat</u>. Upon recommendation of the Council, the Municipal Mayor shall designate an official as Executive Officer of the Council. The designated executive officer must be occupying a permanent position in the municipal organizational structure, capable and willing, and whose duties and responsibilities are related to the powers and services of the Council.

The Council shall promulgate the duties and responsibilities of the Executive Officer: *Provided*, that the following shall be deemed included:

- 1) Secretary of the Council;
- 2) Administer projects and activities of the Council;
- 3) Liaison Officer of the Council with any office or entity;
- 4) Monitor implementation of the provisions of this Code and those promulgated and directed by the Council.

Section 7. <u>Principal Office.</u> The Municipal Hall shall serve as the principal office of the council.

Article III CHILD SERVICE VOLUNTEERS

Section 8. <u>Child Service Volunteers.</u> The Local Council for the Welfare & Protection of Children shall deputize and designate at least one Child Service Volunteer in every barangay, school, including commercial establishments, church, other entities and organization as may be determined by the Council.

A volunteer must at least be a high school graduate, able and willing to assist the Council and advocate child welfare and protection: *Provided, however*, That a resident teacher, a social worker, a barangay Health Worker or a day Care Worker may be given preference in the case of the barangays.

Section 9. <u>Duties and Functions of Child Service Volunteers</u>. The following are the duties and functions of a volunteer:

- 1) Serve as the Official Coordinator of the Council in his or her area;
- 2) Monitor and report to the Council at a regular or periodic basis the existence and nature of every case directly or indirectly involving a child or children, any incident of child abuse, including benefits being given by, or program or project adopted and implemented for the welfare, development and protection of a child or children in his or her area, organization or entity, as the case may be;

- 3) Assist the Council in all its activities within his or her area;
- Suggest or recommend to the Council programs, projects or activities that may be adopted or implemented in his or her area, as well as pre-emptive, remedial or corrective measures;
- 5) Attend meetings and related gatherings of the Council.

Section 10. <u>Benefits</u>. Subject to the approval of the Municipal mayor, the Council shall adopt appropriate benefits for all volunteers which are not limited to financial assistance or honoraria, and promulgate the guidelines in availing of such benefit or assistance.

Article IV ANNUAL ACTION PLAN FOR CHILDREN

Section 11. <u>Annual Action Plan for Children</u>. Not later than September of every year, the Council shall formulate and adopt an Annual Action Plan for Children for the following year which shall consist of the following:

- 1) the calendar of activities that are to be undertaken, the targeted or expected participants and beneficiaries, the nature and significance, the lead agency, and its proposed budgetary requirement;
- 2) The projects to be carried out or be undertaken, its nature and significance, the lead agency or office, and its proposed funding requirement;
- 3) The programs to be launched, its nature and significance, targeted or expected participants and beneficiaries, the lead agency, and its funding requirement.

In the formulation of action plans, the Council shall always include and institutionalize those prescribed in this Code, and those inter-sectoral commitments submitted by the members of the Council.

Section 12. <u>Plan Requirements and Standards</u>. In the formulation and development of the component programs, projects and activities of the action plans, the Council shall be guided by, and towards the accomplishment of, the "Child 21's" goals and the requirements and standards to achieve children's health, nutrition, education, protection and participation in socio-cultural and development activities as formulated by the Council for the Welfare of Children. (Table 1).

Section 13. Mainstreaming into the Municipal Investment/Development Plan. The action plan shall be submitted to the Municipal Development Council (MDC) for integration to the proposed Annual Municipal Development /Investment Plan for the following year.

The Municipal Development/investment Plan shall not be submitted to the Municipal Development Council unless the action plan be integrated thereof, and the Sanggunianag Bayan, in its approval pursuant to the Local Government Code, shall see to it that such action plan had been duly considered and mainstreamed therein.

Any particular item or items in the action plan not integrated in the Annual Development/Investment Plan shall be the responsibility of the Council to find alternative means for its implementation.

Section 14. <u>Duty of the Council Chairman and Executive Officer.</u> It is the duty of the Chairman and the Executive Officer of the Council to submit such action plan and for its integration into the investment or development plans of the municipality.

It is likewise their duty to monitor the implementation of its approved component programs, projects and activities, and to report to the Council their progress status and monitoring reports.

Article V

INVENTORY OF CHILDREN AND PREGNANT WOMEN

Section 15. Inventory of Children and Pregnant Women. The Council, in coordination with the Municipal Health Office, the barangay councils, and through Child Service Volunteers, shall conduct a continuing inventory and maintain a profile of children and pregnant women population of the municipality on a quarterly basis.

The updated profile for children shall be in an appropriate statistical presentation, showing the number of birth and death, age bracket or groupings, those in-school and out-of-school, health profile, and other data the Council may require, such as abnormalities of children.

Section 16. <u>Computer-aided Profile and Data Generation</u>. The Council shall develop a computer-aided information system that process and generate data, and the management of such system shall be user-friendly and generally accessible, subject only to regulations and policies prescribed therefore.

Section 17. <u>Reporting of Births and Pregnancies</u>. Subject to the recommendations of the Council, all sangguniang barangays shall promulgate their respective ordinance requiring the reporting of every child birth and pregnant women to their respective Child Service Volunteers who in return submits a validated summary report to the Council Secretariat.

Section 18. <u>Data and Reports Analysis.</u> The Council shall periodically analyze profiles and reports and render its recommendations to the Municipal Mayor, and such recommendations must be related with, or toward the realization of, the Child 21 standards and requirements. A recommendation may either pertains to general case or problem affecting a number or group of children or to a particular child.

Article VI CIVIL REGISTRATION OF CHILDREN

Section 19. Registration of Every Child. It shall be the responsibility of the parent(s) or guardian residing or staying in the municipality to register a child at birth with the Municipal Civil Registrar, or which must be not later that one (1) week from birth.

Any information or unregistered child that reaches to the knowledge of the Child Service Volunteer shall, after verification, be reported by him or her to the Municipal Civil Registrar who in return shall cause the registration.

Section 20. Birth or Delivery of Non-resident in the municipality. It is a mandatory that if a non-resident choose to deliver, or a child was born in the municipality, the concerned parent shall register the child with the Municipal Registrar of Nueva Era..

Section 21. Mass Civil Registration of Children. Upon the effectivity of this Code, the Municipal Civil Registrar shall conduct at least twice a year (preferably on the 1st week of February and October] a barangay-based outreach child registration services.

Section 23. Child Birth Certificate. The Municipal Civil Registrar shall issue not earlier than fifteen days from registration and free of charge a copy of certificate of live birth of every child registered with its office: *Provided, However,* That any certificate secured thereafter shall be paid in accordance with the Revenue Code of the Municipality

Article VII

CHILDREN HEALTH ASSISTANCE AND SERVICES

Section 24. Immunization of Children. It shall be the responsibility of every parent of guardian to cause the expanded program on immunization of his/her child against BCG, tuberculosis, diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, oral polio vaccine (OPV)/pneumococal conjugate vaccine (PCV) measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) and hepatitis B with the Municipal Health Office.

If the immunization shall be done by any medical practitioner or institution other than the Municipal Health Office, the concerned parents or guardian shall secure a proof of compliance thereof and which shall be available for any authorized verifications.

The concerned Child Service Volunteer is authorized to conduct periodic verification of such proofs of immunization of all children in his or her area.

Section 25. Vitamin Supplementation/Micronutrient Supplementation. It shall likewise be the responsibility of every parent or guardian to give one (1) dose of Vitamin A starting at 6-11 months and 1-5 years old are given Vitamin A capsules twice a year and micronutrient supplementation for prevention of underweight, anemia, and iron deficiency disorder to children.

Section 26. Child Health Awareness Week/bservance of Children's Week Celebration. Upon coordination with the Council which shall be not later than one (1) month from the approval of this Code, the Municipal Mayor shall, by appropriate issuance therefore, promulgate and institutionalize a Child Health Awareness Week in the municipality. The weeklong observance shall extend a package of health services for children to include, but not limited to, the following:

- 1) mass immunization
- 2) mass vitamin supplementation;
- 3) medical, surgical, dental and visual examinations and services;
- 4) special supplemental feeding;
- 5) child-oriented lectures, preferably on the subjects of anti-illegal drugs, smoking, prevailing child health risk;
- 6) presentation of Researchers and related forum;
- 7) launching special projects benefiting children;
- 8) Institutionalized programs of the Department of Health.
- 9) Physical fitness/sports activities for healthy lifestyle.

During the observance, the municipality may tap the services or mobilize the participation and involvement of other entities, medical practitioners, hospitals or clinics, schools, barangay volunteers and interested organizations.

The celebration of the children and youth week is done every 3rd week of October in the municipality and the observance of the National Children's week celebration is done every month of November.

Section 27. Pregnant Women Health Day. Upon recommendation of the Council, the Municipal Mayor shall, by appropriate issuance, promulgate and institutionalize a Pregnant Women Health Day once a month. During such day, the Local Government Unit thru the Municipal Health Office shall provide or extend package of health services to pregnant women, such as pre-natal consultation, pregnancy orientation/lectures, and laboratory services.

In the implementation, the municipality, through the said offices, may tap or mobilize the participation of interested individual or group medical practitioner (s), clinic or hospitals, to undertake their services inside the barangay health stations and RHU Lying in clinic, subject to appropriate arrangement.

Every pregnant women shall be provided financial assistance from the Local Government Unit for laboratory expenses. Likewise, upon delivery, financial assistance shall be provided for the newborn screening expenses for the newborn babies.

Section 28. Grave Health cases and Abnormalities. The Council shall take cognizant, and after deliberation, decide a form of assistance to any child suffering from grave health ailment or abnormalities. In every case, and based on a case study conducted therefore by the Municipal Health Office and Municipal Social welfare Office, the Council shall adopt appropriate package of assistance services which include referral services, hospitalization assistance or financial assistance. In all cases, the Council shall respect the religious belief of the family and maintain confidentiality of identity of the child.

Section 29. Supplemental Feeding Program. Within six (6) months from the effectivity of this Code, the Municipal Health Office, Municipal Nutrition Action Officer and the Municipal Social Welfare Office shall rationalize the supplemental feeding program of the municipality by formulating and adopting an implementing guidelines therefore. The program shall outline, among others, the following components:

- 1) objective or problem (s) to be solved;
- 2) beneficiaries;
- 3) procedures of the feeding program;
- 4) sources of funds and supplies;
- 5) results evaluation system.

Article VIII CHILDREN EARLY EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Section 30. Municipal Day Care Services and Pre-School Programs. It shall be the responsibility of every parent or guardian to have his or her child who is from three (3) to six (6) years old to attend an early education program which include the day care services and the pre-school programs of the barangay and the municipality: *Provided*, That whenever possible, the child shall be enrolled to the Child Development Center established in the barangay where he or she resides.

Towards this purpose, the concerned Child Service Volunteer shall include in his monitoring and reporting, responsibilities the children ranging from three (3) to six (6) years old who are not enrolled in any accredited Day care Center or Pre-school, as the case may be, and submit the same to the Municipal Social Welfare Office and to the Council, indicating therein the concerned parents or guardian.

Section 31. Pre-schools Monitoring Reports. Effective upon approval of this Code, the Municipal Social Welfare office shall establish and maintain an integrated monitoring chart and reports covering all child development centers and pre-schools (public or private] in the municipality.

The monitoring chart and report shall contain or indicate, but not limited to, the following:

- 1) name of center or schools and its location;
- 2) owner or administrator of the center or school;
- 3) enrollment population;
- 4) teacher or its equivalent;
- 5) official schedule of classes.

It shall also secure a certified copy of the center's or school's policy of instructions or similar instrument governing the center.

Section 32. Inspection of Centers and Pre-schools. Notwithstanding the inspection and evaluations being done by any other office or agency, the Council may cause the actual inspection of any center or pre-school in furtherance of its powers and function, including for the purpose of ascertaining the existence or non-existence of a report, as well as its compliance to standards, such as physical facilities, authorized fees and charges imposed, sanitary and educational facilities.

Section 33. Improvement of Child Development Centers. The Municipal Social Welfare office shall submit to the Municipal Mayor and to the Council a report as to the following:

- 1) child development centers needing building replacement or expansion;
- 2) Child development centers needing facilities for improvement;

Section 34. Medium-Term Day Care Services Development Program. In the submission of the report required in the preceding section, the Office shall likewise formulate and submit a Medium-Term Day Care Service Development Program for consideration of the Municipal Development Council. The program shall include:

- 1) center building construction and/or improvement;
- 2) teachers/workers continuing competencies;
- 3) Standardized criteria of center facilities, teacher/workers recruitment qualifications, benefits, policies and curricula.

Article IX IN-SCHOOL CHILDREN SUPPORT SERVICES

Section 35. School Children Assistance and Incentive Fund. The Municipal School Board shall establish in its annual budget a Schoolchildren Assistance and Incentive Fund, the amount of which shall be recommended by the District Supervisor in coordination with the representative of Integrated Parent-Teachers & Community Association (PTCA).

The Board shall promulgate the implementing guidelines, but which necessarily include or based on the following parameters:

- 1) The Assistance Fund component to subsidize classroom needs of children belonging to the indigent families, which include basic school supplies and textbooks;
- 2) The Incentive Fund component to finance or grant incentives, in the form of cash or otherwise, to deserving pupils in academics, sports, scouting, leadership, and other extraordinary achievements. It shall also extend to teaching and non-teaching officials or personnel, who had shown or done outstanding achievement.

Every assistance or incentive to be granted shall be decided by the Board upon presentation and consideration of the proper justification therefore the Fund, or any unexpended balance thereof, shall not be used or realigned for any other purpose without proper consultation with the officers or representative of the integrated PTCA and a duly recognized organization of teaching and non-teaching personnel of the municipality.

Section 36. Institutionalized LGU Medal Awards. Starting from the school year which this Code shall take effect, the Municipal School Board shall provide a LGU-specially designed medals to be awarded to pupils and students belonging to the honor roll of all levels in all schools in the municipality. The design of the medal awards shall be institutionalized and shall not be modified unless otherwise authorized by appropriate ordinance.

Section 37. LGU Scholarship Program. The Sangguniang Bayan, in coordination with the Municipal School Board, shall, within a reasonable time after the approval of this Code, establish a Scholarship Program for Children of the municipality.

Article X OUT-OF-SCHOOL CHILDREN SERVICES

Section 38. Alternative Education Services. The Municipal School Board shall cause the adoption and integration into the local non-formal education program a barangay-based alternative education services for out-of-school children, which include maintenance of reading centers in every barangay.

Section 39. Employment Assistance. Upon approval of this Code, the municipal Public Employment Service Office (PESO) shall formulate an employment assistance projects of out-of-school children and incorporate in its annual program, subject to applicable labor standards or regulations for working children.

Article XI SPECIAL SUPPORT PROGRAMS FOR CHILDREN

Section 40. Annual Children's Assembly. The last day of the declared Children Awareness Week pursuant to an order issued therefore shall be considered as annual assembly for children, known thereof as "Children's Festival. The Council shall formulate and adopt the features of the annual assembly.

Section 41. Bright Child. The Council shall institutionalize an annual search and recognition of gifted children of the municipality, known thereof as "Bright Child of the Year", and provide incentives therefore.

Section 42. Fund Drives for Children. Subject to the prior presentation and adoption of a project or activity design therefore, any fund raising campaigns or drives where the proceeds thereof are exclusively and directly for the benefits of children of the Municipality of Nueva Era initiated by any barangay or organization shall be exempted of permit fees, notwithstanding to the provision of an ordinance to the contrary.

Section 43. Specific Prohibited Acts or Treatment of Children; Penalties. While within the territorial jurisdiction of the municipality, the following are prohibited acts or omissions with their corresponding sanctions or penalties:

- 1) deliberately or negligently allowing a child of three (3) years or below roaming or playing alone in a public street or road;
- 2) deliberately or negligently allowing a child regardless of age or sex roaming or playing outside of residence naked.

Any person may report such erring parent or guardian for violating any or both of the above acts or omission and, upon verification, the Council shall call the attention in person of the parents or guardian for child care orientation.

3) transporting by vehicle a child of ten (10) years old or below be improperly loaded. For the purpose of this Code, a child is improperly loaded when she or she is not safety seated inside the vehicle.

Penalty - a fine of two hundred pesos (P200.00)

- 21. All families have safe drinking water.
- 22. All use iodized salt.
- 23. All families use sanitary latrine.
- 24. all fathers and mothers share in the care and rearing of children.

PARTICIPATION

25. All children 12-17 years old participate in socio-civic and community development activities.

Article XII FINAL PROVISIONS

Section 44. Reports. Not later than the thirtieth day of March of the following year, the Council shall render its annual report as to the implementation of this Code, particularly including its accomplishments, observations and recommendations.

Section 45. Separability Clause. If any provision of this Code is declared invalid or unconstitutional by appropriate agency or office, the remaining provisions not affected thereby shall continue in full force and effect.

Section 46. Repealing Clause. All Ordinances, resolutions and other issuances inconsistent with the provision of this Code are hereby repealed and modified accordingly.
